

Teen Driving Facts!

- Teens face the greatest risk of crashing during their first year of driving. One out of every five licensed 16-year-olds will be in a vehicle crash.
- Nearly half of all fatal car crashes involving teen drivers are single-car crashes. Drivers (ages 16-21) accounted for over 1/3rd of all Pennsylvania's single vehicle run-off-the-road type crashes in 2009. Teens are more likely than any other age group to be involved in a single-car crash.
- The accident rate among teen drivers doubles when the number of passengers in the car increases from two to three.
- An estimated 6% of car accidents are directly related to the use of cell phones while driving each year. The risk of getting in a wreck quadruples when drivers are talking on the phone.
- The total reported vehicle crashes in Pennsylvania was 124,092 in 2012. 1,310 resulted in death. This equals a death to crash ratio of 1 in 94. The average economic loss is \$6,258,621. The estimated economic lifetime cost resulting from these 1,310 deaths is a staggering \$8,198,793,104!
- In 2012, the economic loss due to traffic crashes was \$1,164.00 to every man, woman, and child in Pennsylvania.
- In 2012, pennsylvania drivers ages 16-20 were involved in 25,766 crashes. Of the reported crashes, 15,227 were male drivers and 10,539 were female drivers.
- ▶ In 2012, drivers (ages 16-21) accounted for 40.1% of all single vehicle crashes (12,201) and 60% of all multiple vehicle crashes (18,266) in Pennsylvania.
- Young drivers (ages 16-21) are the least experienced drivers. It has been stated nationally that 85-90% of all traffic crashes involve some sort of driver error that contributes to the crash. Therefore, as drivers, we can greatly impact traffic safety by driving smart and driving defensively.


Above all of these, her greatest possession was her ability to demonstrate compassion, caring, and kindness for those with whom she came in contact.
